

PROGRAM OVERVIEW



The Medication Support with Cerebral Palsy
Project was designed to provide selected children
with Cerebral Palsy access to prescription
lifesaving anti-seizure medications to improve
the quality of their lives.


The project provided the selected children with two months supply of their prescribed medication (Encorate Chrono 200mg and 500mg), thereby reducing the cost from the parents and ensuring improved quality of life for the children.

This project is important because in the course of our work, one of the major causes of deaths in children with Cerebral Palsy that we have experienced is uncontrolled seizures which is exacerbated by the lack of access to medication. This lack of access to medication has been worsened by the rising costs of medication due to inflation, leading many caregivers to either skip the medication entirely or reduce dosage below what is prescribed in a bid to make the existing medication last longer.



ARRIVALS AND BASELINE INTERVIEWS





Participants began arriving as early as 9.30am. Each participant was signed in and a short baseline interview to collect data on how long their children have been on medication and the impact of the cost of living on their ability to continue to adhere to prescriptions was conducted.

5 participants were present and interviewed.

The Participants showed their appreciation and prayed for the sponsors of the Medication. They also testified on how far it was going to go for them. 100% of participants attested to cost inflation of medications leading to them having to not buying medicationa accordingly.



GODWILL MESSAGES AND PRESENTATION OF MEDICATIONS



Bonaholo Ebewele proceeded to give the goodwill message to the parents, she appreciated the parents for coming down to the foundation despite the rainfall to come get the medication for their children and sharing the purpose of the collaborative project with them and how glad we are to support the health and well-being of the Children.



This moved swiftly into the presentation of the medication packs which had been previously packaged based on each beneficiary's received prescription
